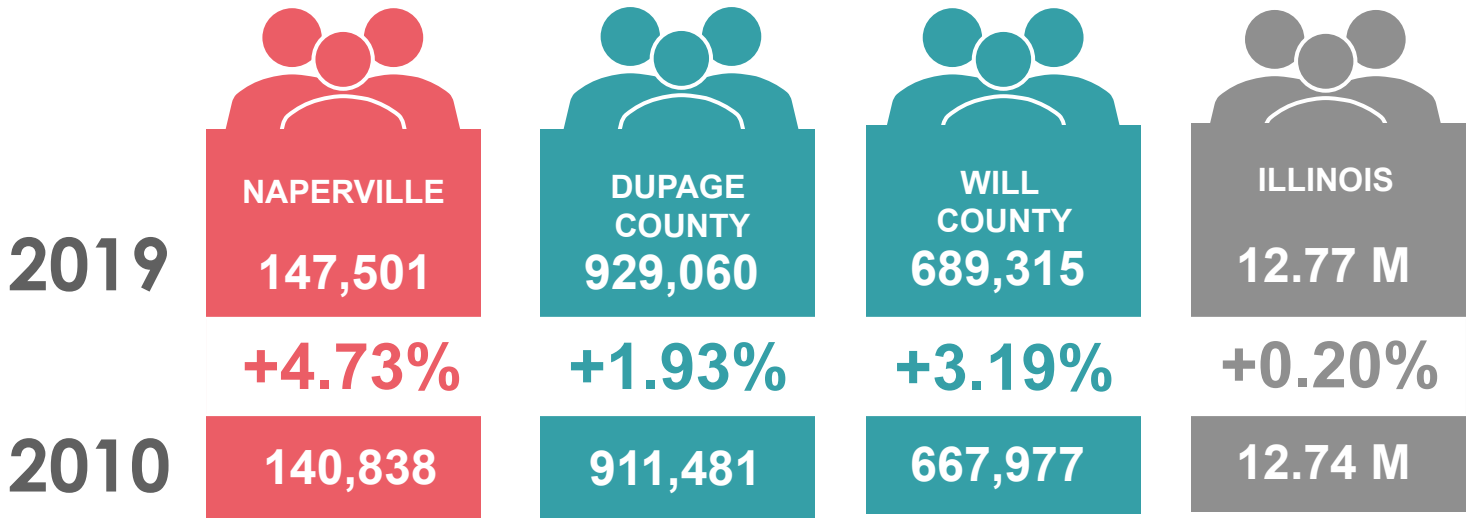

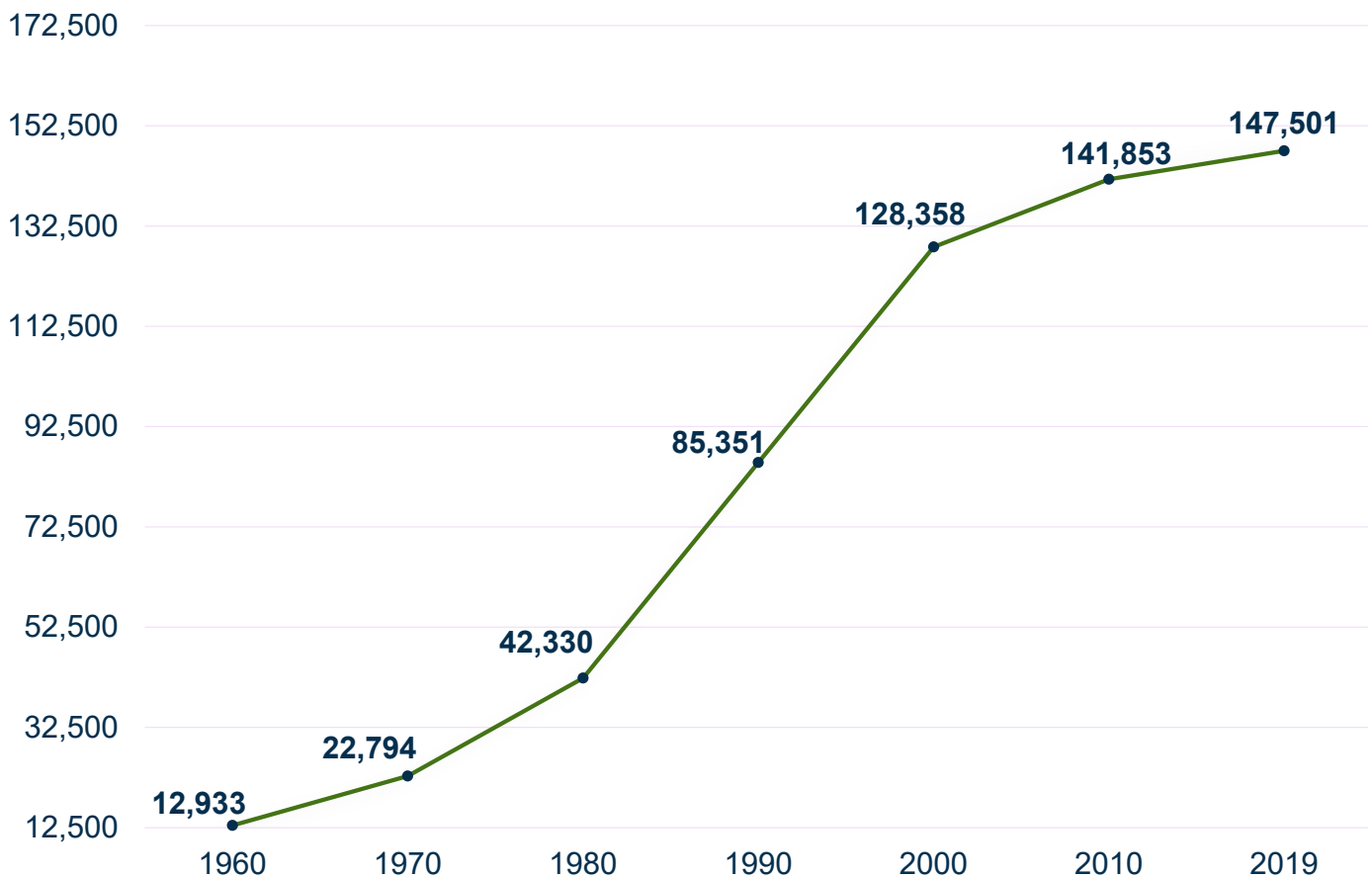

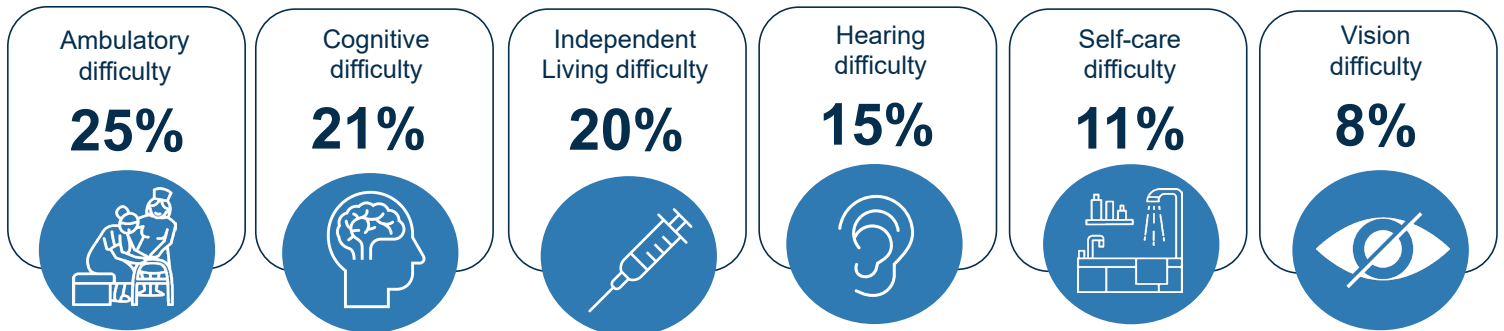

2019 Education Attainment



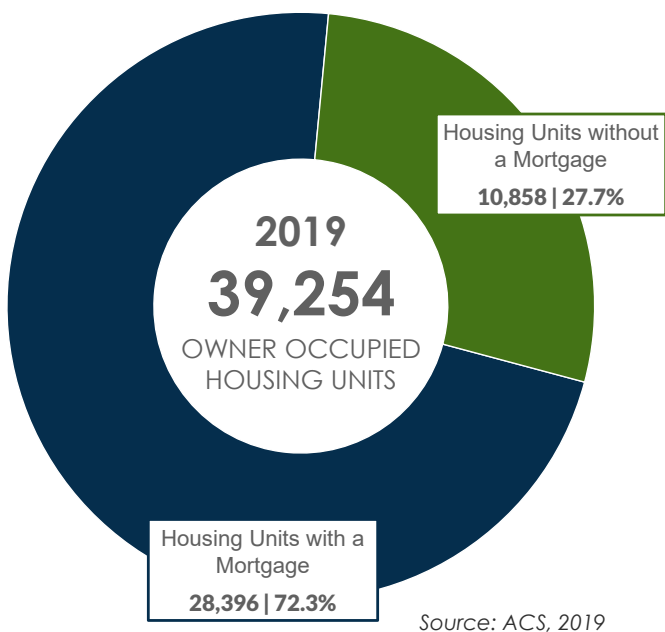

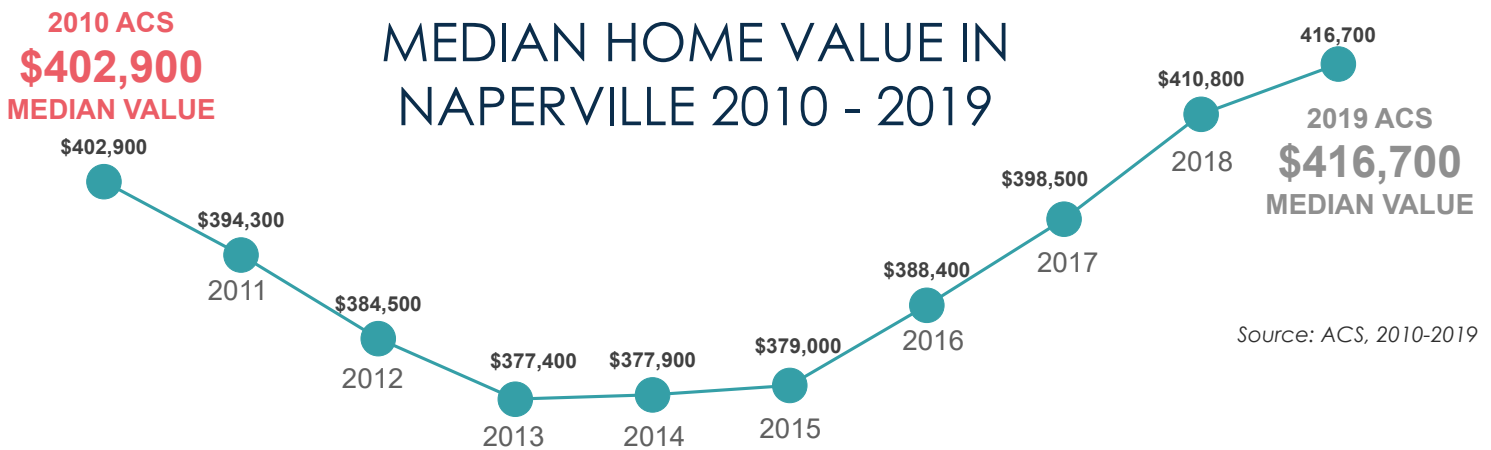

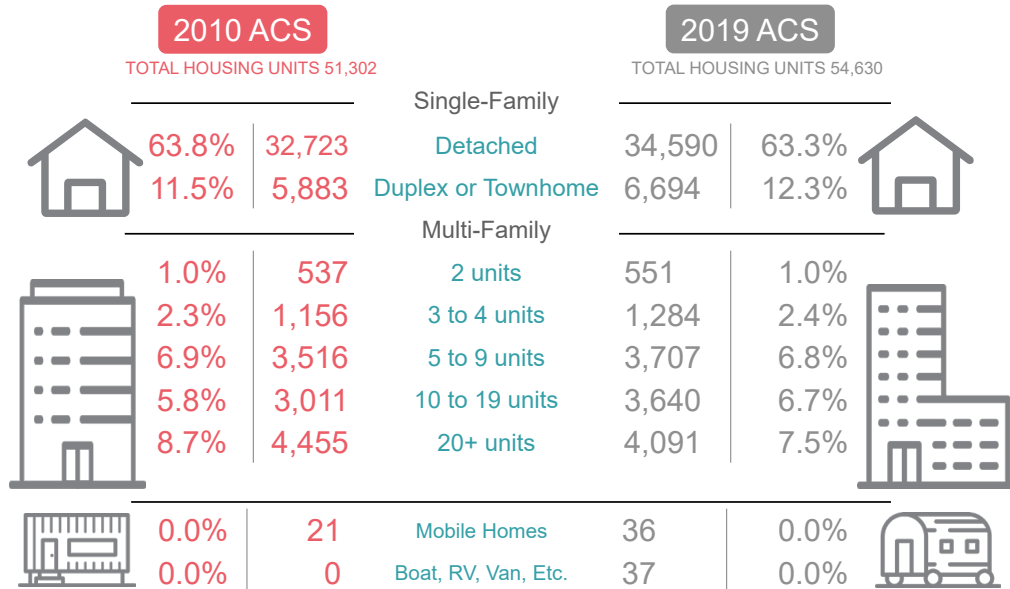

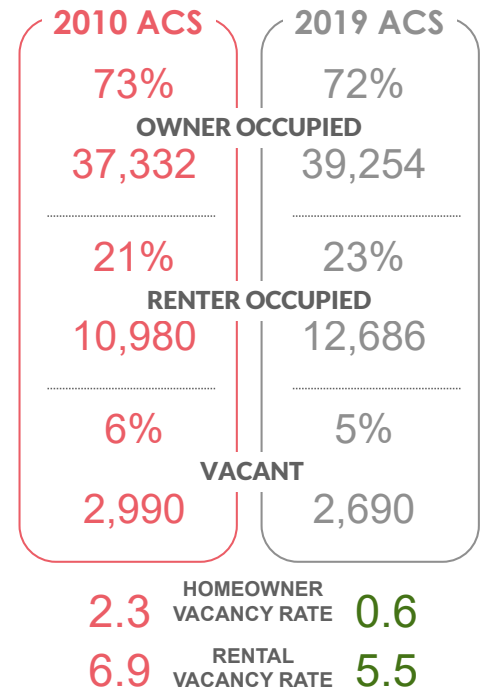


HOUSING UNITS BY STRUCTURE



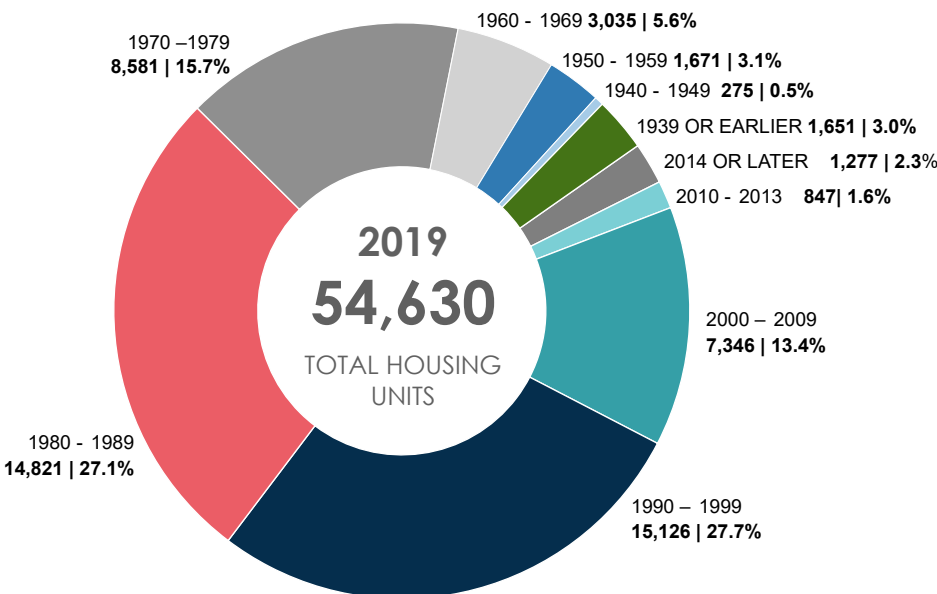

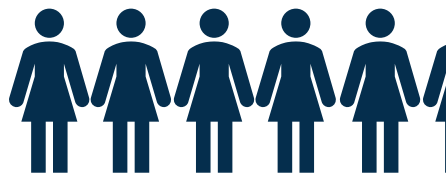

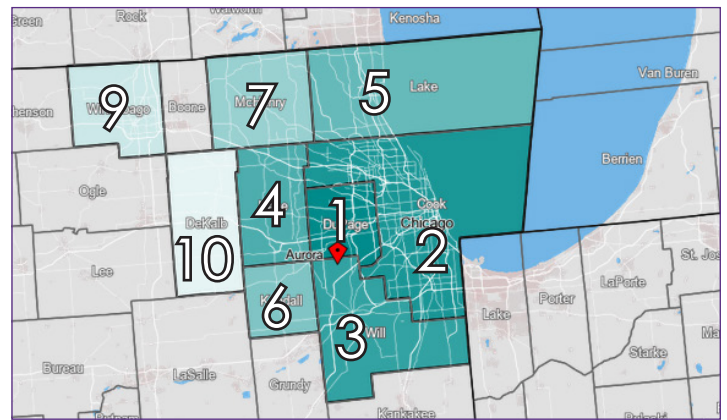
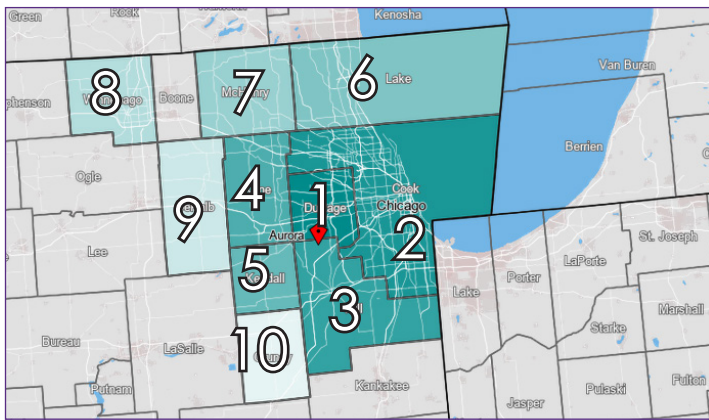


EMPLOYMENT INFLOW & OUTFLOW

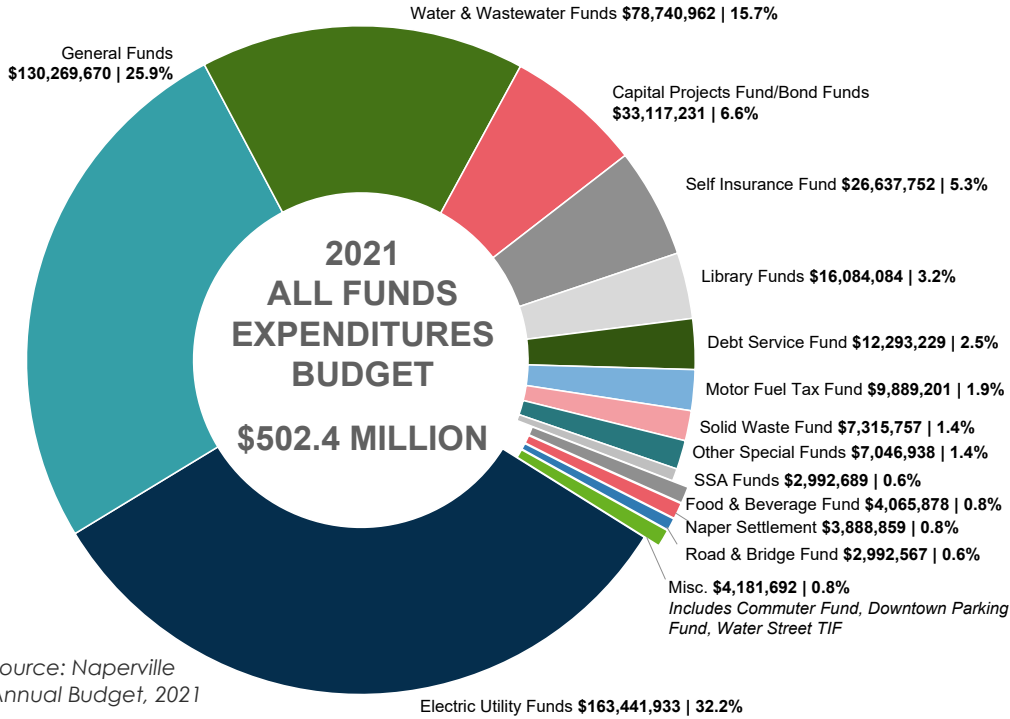

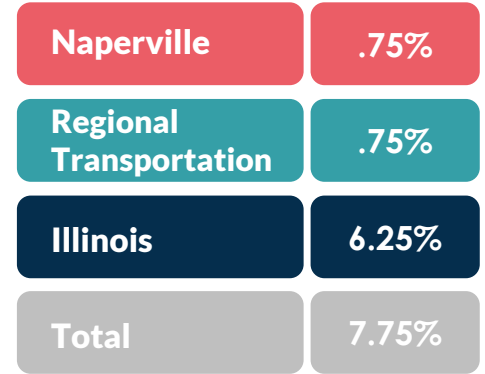

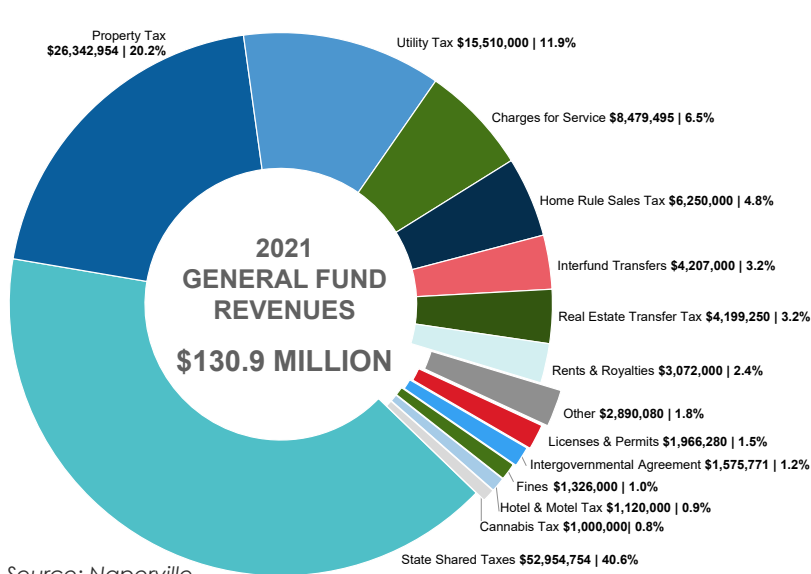

SALES TAX RATES IN NAPERVILLE

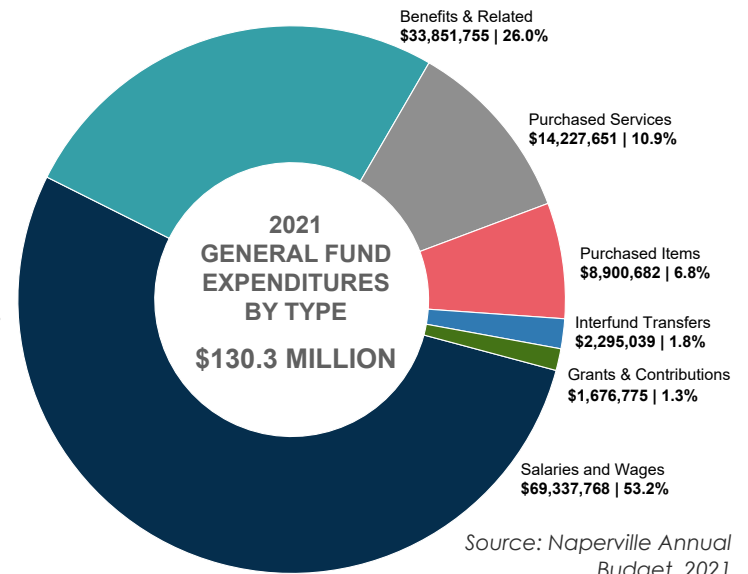

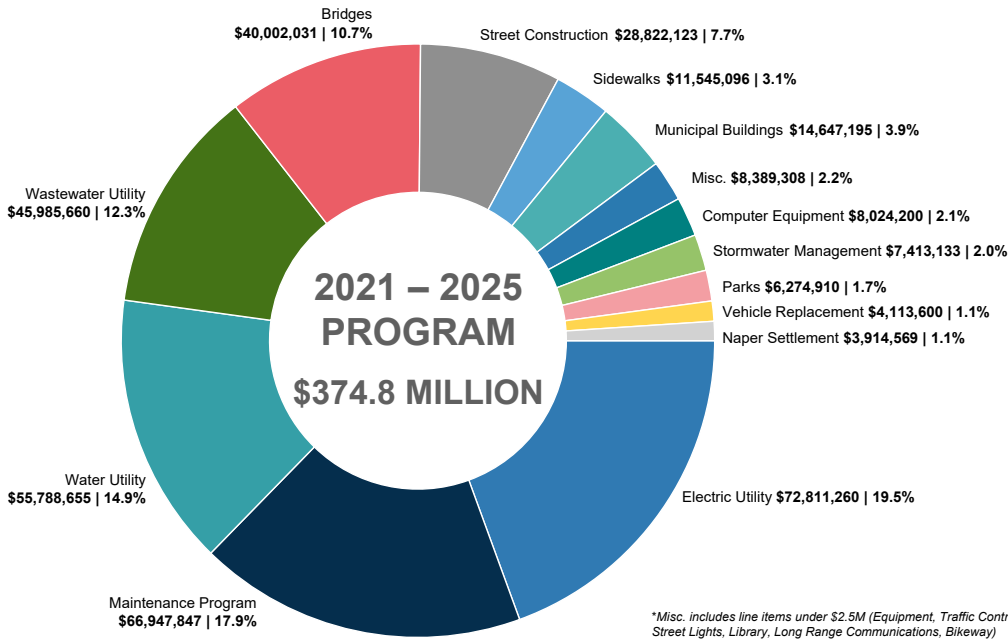

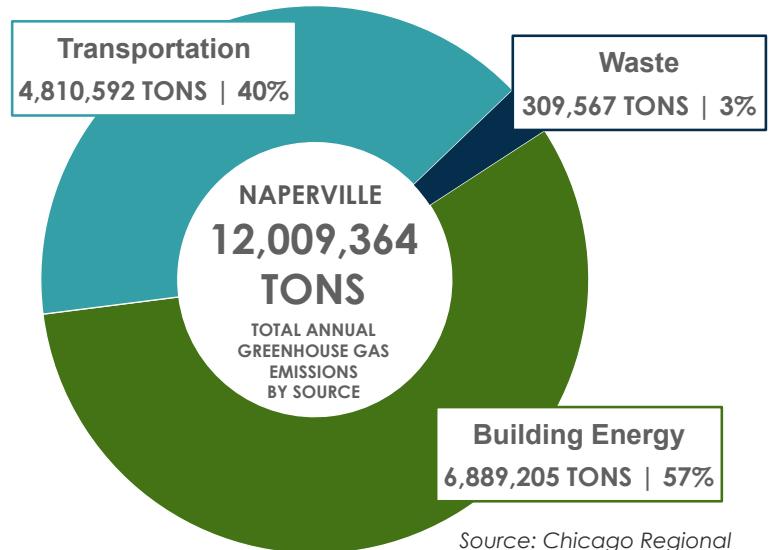

The 2019 "State of Air" report revealed that Chicago ranked the 18th most polluted city in the nation for ozone pollution, which was worse than the year before where the city ranked 22nd.

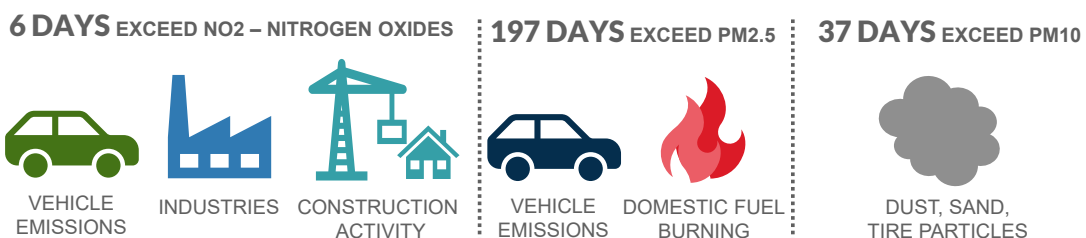

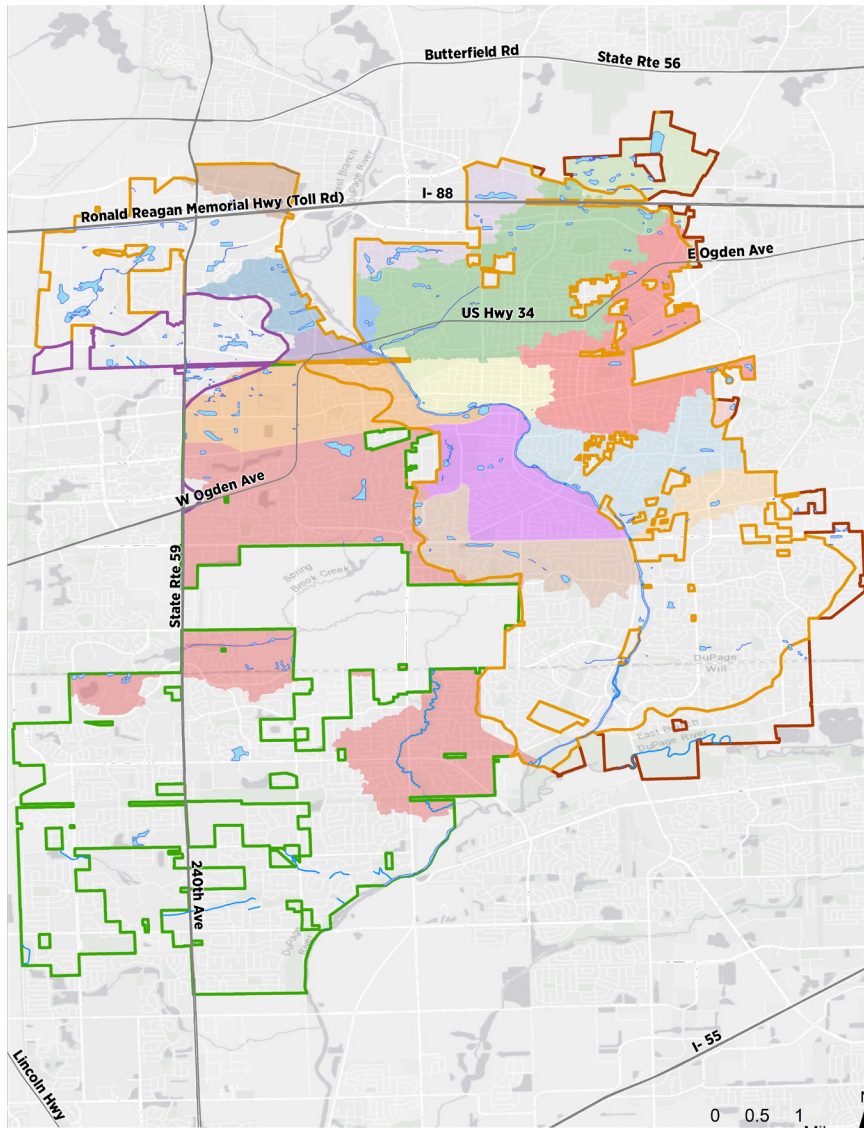

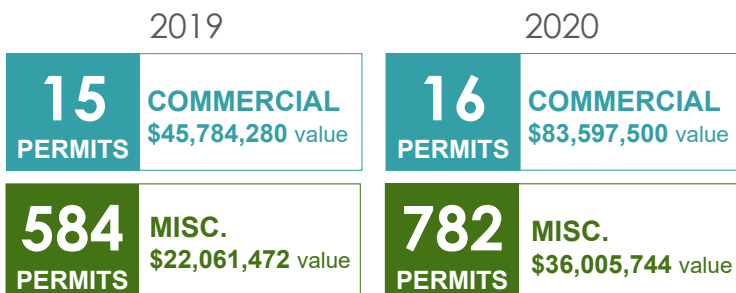

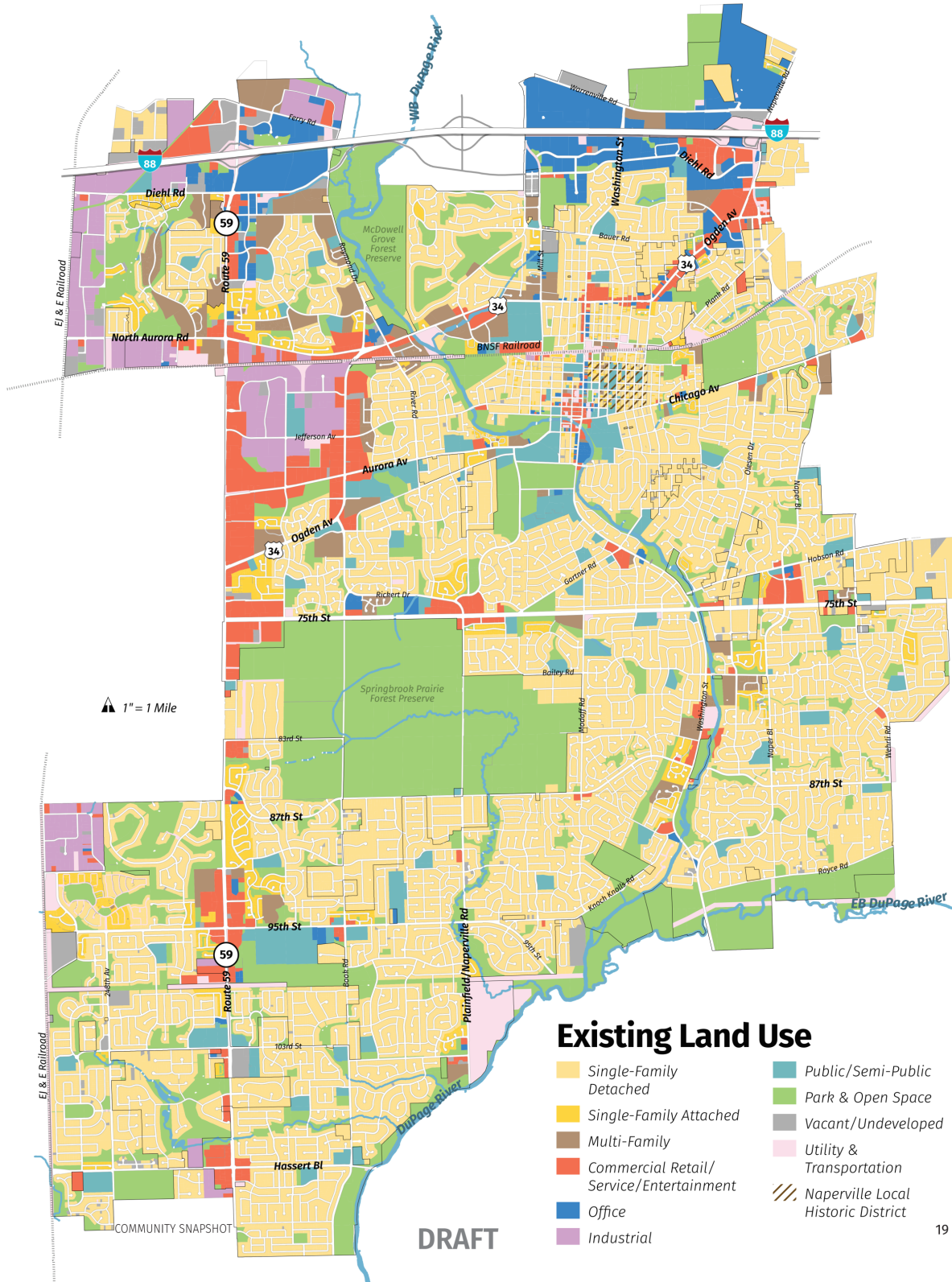

EXISTING LAND USE

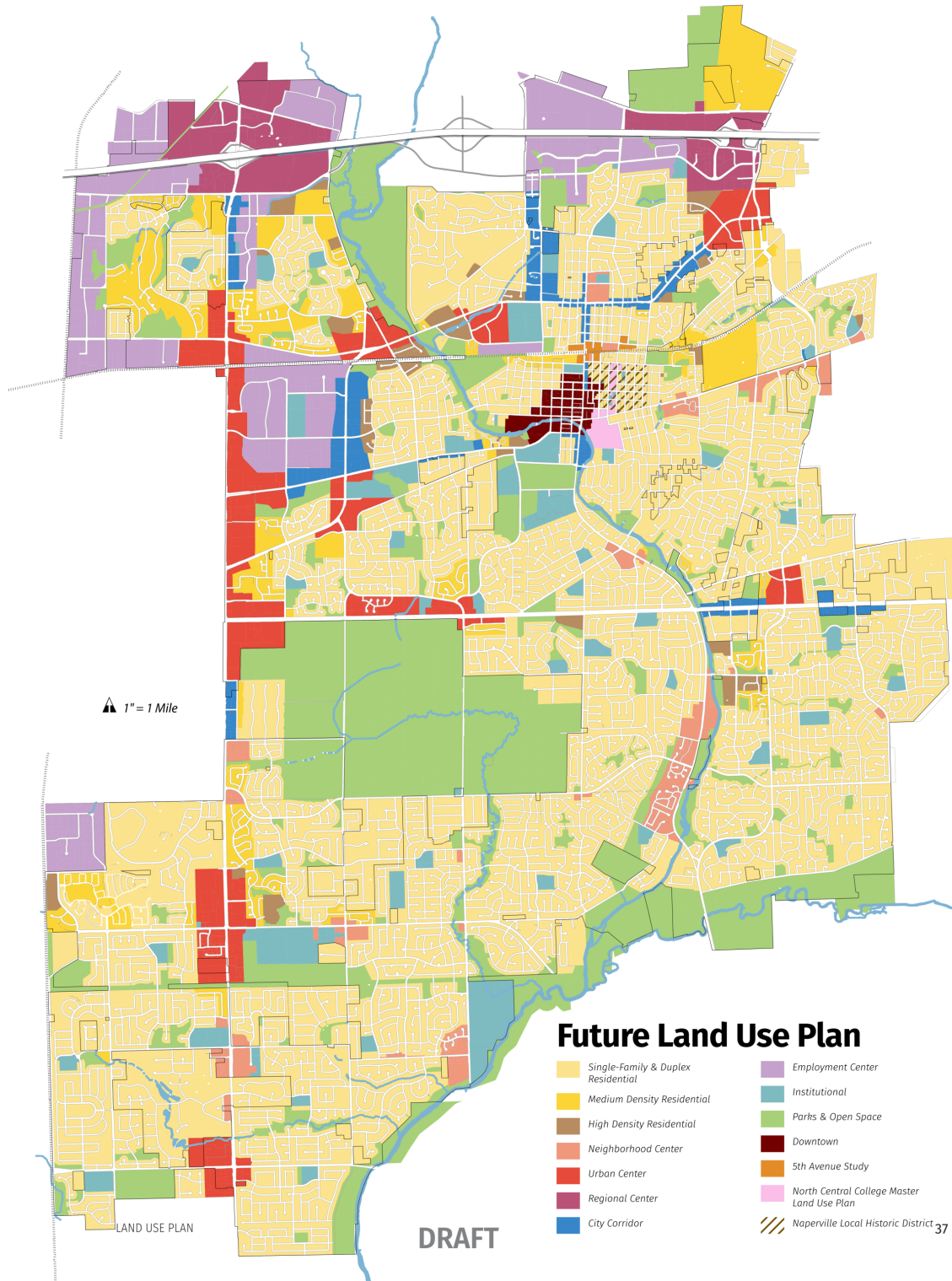
